


Super Slinky Rope




Made in Tubular Herringbone stitch this is just right for hanging a Rivoli Sunray Pendant. The slim, toggle end of the rope will fit through a 8-9mm loop with ease, so you can change your pendant to match your outfit.

You Will Need
5-8g of DB1851 galvanised light pewter Delica beads A
One MB931 square toggle clasp.






The rope starts with a two-bead Square stitch block. This forms a neat foundation for the Tubular Herringbone stitch technique.

Herringbone stitch adds two beads at a time. The two beads sit in a V, or chevron, giving the rope a slinky appearance and maximum flexibility.


1 Prepare the needle with 2m of single thread and tie a keeper bead 50cm from the end (fig 1). The 50cm tail will be used to make the looped end of the rope when the main length is complete.



2 The Foundation Block - Thread on 4A. Pass up the first 2A and back down the second 2A to make two columns of 2A (fig 2).




Thread on 2A. Pass down the second 2A and up the new 2A (fig 3). This is Square stitch.





Repeat to add one more column of 2A.

Link the first column to the fourth column with a square stitch (fig 4). This completes the foundation block.




For clarity the following diagrams show the block laid flat - as four, side-by-side columns.

3 Tubular Herringbone Stitch - Thread on 2A. Pass down the next A bead around the top of the block and up the following 1A (fig 5). Thread on 2A. Pass down the next A bead around the block and up the following A bead (the bead underneath the first A bead of this row) (fig 6).




Pass the needle up through the first bead of the row just completed to be in the correct position to start Row Two (fig 7).

4 Thread on 2A. Pass down the next A bead around and up the following 1A (as fig 5).



Thread on 2A. Referring to fig 8 pass down the next A bead around the block and up the next A bead around (the bead underneath the first A bead of this row). Pass up through the first bead of the row just completed to be ready to start the next row (fig 8). The chevron effect should be starting to appear.



Repeat Step 4 until the rope is long enough for your pendant.

5 Add the Toggle Bar - Thread on 11A. Pass the needle through the connecting loop on the bar and down through the diagonally opposite A bead at the end of the rope. Pass up through the adjacent A bead. Position the bar at the centre of the loop so the middle A bead of the 11A sits in the hole of the loop. Thread on 5A. Pass through this middle A bead and thread on 5A. Pass through the diagonally opposite A bead at the end of the rope (the only available A bead). Reinforce these stitches with at least two passes of thread before finishing off the ends neatly and securely.

6 Add the Clasp Loop - At the other end of the rope remove the keeper bead, attach the needle to this end and repeat Step 5. Finish off all remaining thread ends neatly and securely.
